

POSTAL REGULATIONS.

Letters (*Inland*).—1 oz. 1d.; 2 oz. 2d.; each additional 2 oz. or fraction, $\frac{1}{2}$ d. Size limits: length, 2 ft.; width or depth, 1 ft. **Foreign**, British Possessions generally, U.S.A., British Postal Agencies in Morocco and at Wei-hai-wei, and H.M. Ships and Troops serving abroad, 1d. per oz. All other places, 1 oz. $2\frac{1}{2}$ d.; each addit. oz. or fract., $1\frac{1}{2}$ d.

Certificates of Posting of unregistered correspondence, both Inland and Foreign, fee $\frac{1}{2}$ d.

Book Packets.—2 oz. $\frac{1}{2}$ d.; each addit. 2 oz. or fraction, $\frac{1}{2}$ d. Size limits: length, 2 ft.; width or depth, 1 ft.

Foreign Packets.—Printed Papers, $\frac{1}{2}$ d. for 2 oz. Commercial Papers, $2\frac{1}{2}$ d. for first 10 oz.; $\frac{1}{2}$ d. for 2 oz. thereafter. Size limits: British Colonies $2 \times 1 \times 1$ ft.; elsewhere $1\frac{1}{2} \times 1 \times 1$ ft.

Newspapers (*Inland*).— $\frac{1}{2}$ d. each copy not over 6 oz.; each addit. 6 oz. or fraction, $\frac{1}{2}$ d. **Foreign and Colonial**, $\frac{1}{2}$ d. for 2 oz.

British Newspapers, Magazines, and Trade Journals to Canada and Newfoundland.—2 oz. $\frac{1}{2}$ d.; 6 oz. 1d.; $1\frac{1}{2}$ lb. $1\frac{1}{2}$ d.; each additional $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. $\frac{1}{2}$ d. up to 5 lb., 5d. Size limit, $2 \times 1 \times 1$ ft.

Samples (*Foreign*).—4 oz. 1d.; $\frac{1}{2}$ d. for 2 oz. thereafter.

Parcels (*Inland*).—Not exceeding 1 lb. 4d., 2 lb., 5d., 3 lb. 6d., 5 lb. 7d., 7 lb. 8d., 8 lb. 9d., 9 lb. 10d., 10 lb. 11d., and 11 lb. (limit) 1/- . Size limits: length, 3 ft. 6 in.; length and girth combined, 6 ft.

Registered Letters, Parcels and Packets (*Inland*).—Fees and the respective limits of compensation are as follows: 2d. for £5, 3d. for £20, and 1d. for each addit. £20 up to £400.

Parcels to the United States.—*Official Service*—Limit of weight, 11 lb. *Rates*: 3 lb., 1/3; 7 lb., 2/3; 11 lb., 3/3 per parcel for any place in the United States, including Alaska. *Semi-Official Service*.—*Rates*: To New York City, Brooklyn, Jersey City, or Hoboken, 3 lb., 2/6; 7 lb., 3/6; 11 lb., 4/6; to all other places, excluding Alaska, 3 lb., 3/6; 7 lb., 4/6; 11 lb., 5/6.

Post Cards (*Inland*).—Thin, single, $\frac{1}{2}$ d.; reply, 1d.; stout, single, $\frac{1}{2}$ d., 11 for 6d.; reply, $1\frac{1}{2}$ d., 11 for 1/- **Foreign**, single, 1d.; reply, 2d.

Letter Cards.—Single, 1d. each.

Embossed Envelopes with $\frac{1}{2}$ d. Stamp, for Circulars, etc., in open covers, "commercial" ($5\frac{5}{16} \times 3\frac{1}{8}$ ins.), 12 for 7d.; with 1d. Stamp—"commercial," 11 for 1/-.

Telegrams.—9d. first twelve words, $\frac{1}{2}$ d. every addit. word. Addresses charged for. Delivered free within 3 miles of receiving office. 3d. per mile beyond. *London*—free delivery day and night. If desired telephonic addresses may be used in telegrams for delivery by telephone. Copies of such telegrams delivered post free. Telegrams may be telephoned to a Telegraph Office by subscribers or from Public Call Offices at ordinary telegram rates plus call fee.

Postal Orders are issued and paid at most Inland Post Offices, in many Brit. Possessions, and other places abroad. Poundage: 1d. on amounts from 6d. up to 15/-; and 1½d. up to 21/-. Broken amounts may be paid up by the use of Postage Stamps not exceeding 5d., and three in number affixed to the face of any one Postal Order.

Money Orders (Inland).—For sums not exceeding £1, 2d.; £3, 3d.; £10, 4d.; and an additional 2d. for every £10 up to £40.

Money Orders (Foreign).—Payable in British and Allied Countries or their Colonies, 3d. for each £1 or fraction. Payable in Neutral Countries or their Colonies, 4d. for each £1 or fraction.

Telegraph Money Orders (Inland and Foreign).—The Commission is the same as for ordinary Inland and Foreign Money Orders plus a supplementary fee of 2d. and 6d. (or 1/-) respectively, and the cost of the official telegram of advice.

Bill Stamps.—Not exceeding £5, 1d.; £10, 2d.; £25, 3d.; £50, 6d.; £75, 9d.; £100, 1/-, and 1/- extra for every additional £100 or fraction thereof.
