

FOREIGN AND COLONIAL PARCEL POST.

The sender of a parcel for any place abroad must fill up a Customs Declaration on a form provided for the purpose. There are two forms in use, one an adhesive form, to be used in connection with parcels for all British possessions and a few foreign countries, and the other a non-adhesive form, to be used for parcels for all other places abroad.

Broken amounts, excluding halfpence, may be made up by the use of 3 Postage Stamps, not exceeding 5d. in value, affixed to the face of any one Postal Order.

MONEY ORDERS.
